

LEGALISM VS. LOVE

f you attended one of my Monday noon Masses, you will recognize this message. I think its message is important enough for more than just the Monday noon Mass attendees. So, I repeat it here with a few additions.

Last January when the U.S. bishops met for a retreat, their retreat master, Capuchin Franciscan Fr. Raniero Cantalamessa, who was appointed by Pope St. John Paul II and has been the papal household preacher since 1980, reminded our U.S. bishops: "If someone were to observe the law perfectly but did not have the interior disposition of heart that comes from

love, he would not, in fact, be observing the law, but would be pretending to observe it. It would be mere legalism, like that of many Pharisees."

In his first letter to the Thessalonians, St. Paul praises them for their example of faith, love, and hope. In contrast, in the Gospels, Jesus often criticizes the scribes and Pharisees for their heartless, loveless, practice and application of laws, customs, and mere trivia: "Woe to you scribes and Pharisees, you hypocrites." Then Jesus goes on to list all of their trivial and hypocritical practices. Jesus notes that their misplaced priorities and their shameless hypocrisy are not, in fact, observing the law but merely pretending to do so. Jesus' resistance to the Pharisees wasn't about Jewish law but about the way they were administering the law to the Jewish people. They turned good news into bad news; they focused on legalism instead of spirit. I am not advocating ignoring the law for our own purposes, but I am advocating using common sense in applying the law.

It would be easy for us to shake our heads at the failures of the Jewish leaders and say shame on them, but let's look into our own hearts. In his letter to the Thessalonians, St. Paul cautions them and us not to let our religious practices become mere functions and empty signs. Practicing love, compassion, and mercy is as important, if not more important, than insisting on our interpretation of orthodoxy. Law without love is simply legalism; religious practice without love is hypocrisy. I'll bet you never expected to hear that from a Canon Lawyer! A Catholic devoid of love is not really a Christian. Now, those may seem like harsh words, but think of the words Jesus used. Think about this — the scribes and Pharisees are the only people Jesus came close to condemning. Jesus didn't condemn sinners; he reached out to them in love. Jesus refused to condemn the woman taken in adultery; he simply admonished her to sin no more; Jesus forgave Peter for denying Him. Jesus would have forgiven Judas had Judas asked for forgiveness and mercy; instead, Judas despaired. And God will always forgive us because no sin is too big for God to forgive.

Jesus is cautioning us, through his words to the scribes and Pharisees, not to be more concerned about others transgressing laws of lesser importance while we continue to transgress graver laws ourselves. What was it that Jesus said? Don't try to remove the speck from another's eye, until you first remove the beam from your own eye. We must look at our motives for calling down others — is it love or is it wanting to be right? We must look at our motives for why we observe certain religious practices. If love, rather than legalism, is not a part of our religious practices, we're simply blowing in the wind. If we want to imitate Jesus, love will be in the forefront of everything we do.

A LETTER FROM THE BISHOP

14 September 2019

Dear Faithful of the Diocese of Jefferson City,

On Friday, the Missouri Attorney General issued a report based on a 13-month investigation on clergy sexual abuse of minors in the four Roman Catholic dioceses of Missouri. The report is more than 300 pages long and involved a review of records of more than 2,000 priests serving in Missouri since 1945. It provides a list of 163 priests who had reports of an offense against a minor under Missouri Criminal Law, and it reports that the Attorney General will refer 12 priests now removed from ministry to local prosecutors for criminal investigation and possible prosecution. Whether any prosecutions will result from these referrals remains to be seen, but, as with any investigation by law enforcement, the Diocese of Jefferson City will be fully cooperative.

The report finds that since 2002, when the US bishops enacted the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, "the four dioceses in Missouri have implemented a series of reforms that have improved their response to, and reporting of, abuse. This report recommends additional reforms to strengthen oversight and protect victims from future abuse."

It is my sincere hope this report assists the Church in achieving our goals of accountability and transparency, while respecting the legal standards for privacy of all affected by the report. Let me be clear: we must understand sexual abuse, whether by clergy or others, is still a present reality in society. This requires a proper vigilance and the necessity to follow through with safe environment protocols to ensure our children and youth grow and flourish in a healthy Church environment and a societal culture that protects the vulnerable.

To all survivors who suffered clergy sexual abuse in the Diocese of Jefferson City, and to their friends and family members, I offer you an apology from the depths of my heart.

My staff and I are carefully reviewing the report and its recommendations. I am grateful for what each of you do to make our communities safe, healthy and holy places, and for your encouragement and support of these efforts. We can only be a holy people, a people who are better together, if we have confidence in our priests and if you trust me as your shepherd.

May Mary, the Immaculate Conception and our Mother, intercede for us as we strive to follow her Son and Our Lord, Jesus. I am

STEWARDSHIP AT WORK: MISSION **IN CAMPUS MINISTRY**

As a university parish, the St. Thomas More Newman Center has a very special place within church ministries. Our very existence as a Newman Center springs



from the needs of the collegiate communities in Columbia. Our service to students, faculty, and staff is an essential component of the collegiate atmosphere and our mission in the Church.

There are many reasons why you may have chosen the Newman Center as your faith home — proximity, music, preaching, convenience, family, or maybe something else. Regardless of your individual reason, our collective purpose and reason for existence as a Newman Center is to support and enhance the spiritual lives of Catholics on campus.

The steadfast support of the parish, both financial and spiritual, has made our student ministry the largest in the state. Your role as parishioners in this community stewards students in their faith journey while they are in college.

Financially, the parish instituted the Campus Ministry endowment in 2007, and it is now worth \$2.48 million. This funds approximately one quarter of the annual budget for Campus Ministry. In addition, the parish supports another quarter of the Campus Ministry budget through the annual offertory contributions. These financial investments allow the staff to continue to serve the 10,000+ Catholics on our campuses.

Spiritually, parishioners over the years have left an imprint on the ministry as a whole. Whether mentoring or befriending individual students or standing side-by-side with students as catechists, musicians, liturgical ministers, or volunteers, the interactions between residents and college students are what help them to grow into active adult members of the Church. 
For Kids: Does anything in your life get in the way of God? This week, be helpful when it comes to praying with your family and getting ready for church.
